MARY ELLEN CARON, PH.D., COMMISSIONER, DEPARTMENT OF FAMILY AND SUPPORT SERVICES

Mary Ellen Caron, Ph.D., was named commissioner of the new Chicago Department of Family and Support Services in January of 2009 by Mayor Richard M. Daley. The new Chicago Department of Family and Support Services (FSS) is a consolidation of several of the City's former human service departments and works to provide a continuum of support for Chicago's vulnerable residents, beginning at birth through the senior years. From 2004 until December of 2008, Dr. Caron served as commissioner of the Chicago Department of Children and Youth Services, now part of FSS, which provided community-based services that promoted the well-being and successful development of Chicago's youngest residents, while strengthening families and their communities. Previously, Dr. Caron was a special assistant to the chief executive officer of the Chicago Board of Education, where she leveraged her administrative background to improve Chicago's public schools. She opened new schools, closed poor-performing ones and acted as liaison for operations and oversight of professional-development schools. Dr. Caron is the founding principal of the Frances Xavier Warde School, an elementary school with over 700 students in downtown Chicago. Under her leadership, the Department of Children and Youth Services became the recipient of the Gold Quill Award of Excellence – 2006. She also serves in the Prevent Child Abuse Task Force for the City of Chicago and most recently, she received the Women's Initiative Child Link Award, for connecting the youth of Childlink to homeless counseling and summer mentoring programs.

KAREN TAMLEY, COMMISSIONER, MAYOR'S OFFICE FOR PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES

Karen Tamley was appointed Commissioner of the City of Chicago's Mayor's Office for People with Disabilities in 2005 where she manages a department of 38 staff with a \$5.7 million budget. MOPD provides direct services to Chicago residents, permits building plans for accessibility, advises on disability policy and legislation, and leads citywide accessibility initiatives including compliance with federal, state and local laws. She worked as Director of Programs at Access Living of Metropolitan Chicago from 2000 to 2005, where she was responsible for implementation of programs and services of a not-for-profit Center for Independent Living providing advocacy and services to people with all types of physical, sensory and mental disabilities. Responsible for a 36 person staff that includes administration of private and government grants, program evaluation and oversight of agency service and advocacy initiatives. She was Housing Policy Coordinator at Access Living from 1996 to 1999 where she worked to increase the availability of affordable, accessible, integrated housing for people with disabilities at the local, state and national levels, through advocacy, policy reform, legislative initiatives and community organizing. Tamley established working relationships with leadership of government entities including Chicago Department of Housing, Chicago Housing Authority, CHAC and the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development ("HUD"). Tamley worked for Atlantis Community, Inc. in Denver, Colorado from 1992 to 1996 where she forged a partnership with two of Colorado's largest banking institutions to develop a national model home and consumer loan program for low-income people with disabilities. Designed a homebuyer education program and provided pre-mortgage counseling to over 300 individuals with disabilities seeking first-time home ownership. On a national level, she provided technical assistance to banks, disability organizations, government entities and other not-for-profits on the creation of lending products responsive to the credit needs of people with disabilities.

TERRY MAZANY, PRESIDENT AND CEO, CHICAGO COMMUNITY TRUST

Terry Mazany is president and CEO of The Chicago Community Trust. Mazany was selected as just the fifth executive in The Chicago Community Trust's ninety-year history in 2004. In preparation for this appointment, he served as the Trust's chief operating officer in October 2003. Mazany joined the Trust in 2001 as director and senior program officer for the Education

Initiative of The Trust. Before joining the Trust, Mazany served a distinguished career in public school administration, leading improvement efforts in school districts in Michigan and California. He served as the associate superintendent for curriculum and instruction for the Oakland Unified School District. He was selected for this position in Oakland after working three years for the State of California's acclaimed California School Leadership Academy—a State agency providing leading edge training and development to administrators and public schools throughout California. Terry has earned a masters degree in Anthropology and a masters degree in Business Administration, with an emphasis on organizational change, from the University of Arizona. He applied this knowledge of organizational change and continuous improvement first in the Detroit Public Schools, and then in districts throughout the country including Chicago, Baltimore, and San Francisco, as well as many smaller school districts. He consulted directly with hundreds of schools and teachers, developing powerful models of curriculum and assessments within classrooms and pioneering models for whole school change. His work in public education was an extension of his experience in a national project for public sector performance improvement that was the precursor to what became known as re-inventing government. Preceding his work in the public sector, Mazany enjoyed his first career as an archaeologist and dendrochronologist.

JULIA STASCH, VICE PRESIDENT HUMAN AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT, THE MACARTHUR FOUNDATION

Julia Stasch is Vice President of the Program on Human and Community Development of the John D. and Catherine T. MacArthur Foundation. She is responsible for all aspects of the Foundation's grantmaking in the U.S., particularly related to issues of people and place – community and economic development, affordable housing and urban and regional policy – as well as system reform in public education, juvenile justice and mental health; and policy research on cross-cutting social and economic issues. Prior to joining the Foundation, she worked for the City of Chicago, first as Commissioner of the city's Department of Housing and most recently as Chief of Staff to Mayor Richard M. Daley. As Commissioner she led a process resulting in the city's commitment to a \$1.3 billion five-year plan for affordable housing. As Chief of Staff, one of her significant accomplishments was the design and negotiation of the \$1.5 billion plan for transformation of public housing in Chicago. From 1996 to 1997 she was President and Chief Executive Officer of Shorebank Chicago Companies where she was responsible for Chicago operations of Shorebank, including South Shore Bank, the nation's first community development bank. In 1977 Stasch was one of the first four employees of the Chicago-based real estate development firm Stein & Company. When she left in 1996 as President and Chief Operating Officer, the staff numbered 220 and projects included the Metcalfe Federal Building, Chicago's United Center, and expansion of McCormick Place. While at Stein and Company, she became known nationally for her work to include women and minorities in the construction industry. During the first Clinton Administration, Stasch served as Deputy Administrator of the General Services Administration in Washington, a 20,000-person agency responsible for management of government-wide building construction, leasing, and management. Earlier in her career, she was a Vista volunteer and a teacher in the Chicago public school system. Stasch was the founding President of the Board of the Women's Issues Network, and previously served on the Board of Directors of the Women's Business Development Center and Leadership Greater Chicago. She is a member of the Economic Club, the Executives Club, and The Chicago Network and serves on the Mayor's Council of Technology Advisors as well as the board of directors of the Chicago Architecture Foundation. She also served as the chair of the Mayor's Advisory Council on Closing the Digital Divide. Stasch is a summa cum laude graduate of Loyola University, and has a master's degree from the University of Illinois at Chicago.




