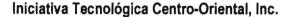

NOTE 1 NATURE OF ACTIVITIES AND SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Nature of Activities

Iniciativa Tecnológica Centro Oriental, Inc. (INTECO) was organized under the General Corporation Law of 1995 of the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico on September 4, 2004 as a non-profit organization. INTECO is organized and operated exclusively for charitable, scientific and educational purposes within the meaning of Sections 501 (c) (3), 170 (c) (2) (B) and 2055 (a) (2) of the United Sates Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, and within the meaning of Section 1104 (4) of the Commonwealth Internal Revenues Code of 1994, as amended, 14 L.P.R.A. 8501 (4).

The purposes for which INTECO is formed are to:

- 1. Broaden the industrial base of the east-central region of Puerto Rico.
- 2. Foster the creation of jobs in the east-central region of Puerto Rico.
- 3. Generate new sources of economic benefits for the east-central region of Puerto Rico.

INTECO is supported primarily through donor contributions and grants.

Basis of Accounting

Basis of accounting refers to the point at which revenues and expenditures are recognized in the accounts and reported in the statement of activities. It relates to the timing of the measurements made, regardless of the measurement focus applied.

Unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets, and permanently restricted net assets, follow the accrual basis of accounting. Under this basis revenues are recorded when earned, independently when are collected, and expenses are recorded when incurred, independently when are paid.

Financial Statements Presentation

The financial statements are presented in accordance with Statement of Financial Accounting Standards (SFAS) No.117, *Financial Statements of Non-Profit Organizations*. This Statement requires that all non-profit organizations provide a statement of financial position, a statement of activities, and statement of cash flows. It requires reporting amounts for the organization's total assets, liabilities, and net assets in a statement of financial position; reporting the change in an organization's net assets in a statement of activities; and reporting the change in its cash and cash equivalents in a statement of cash flows.

This Statement also requires classification of an organization's net assets and its revenues, expenses, gains, and losses based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions. It requires that the amounts for each of three classes of net assets (permanently restricted, temporarily restricted, and unrestricted net assets) be displayed in a statement of financial position and that the amounts of change in each of those classes of net assets be displayed in a statement of activities.

Contributions Received and Contributions Made

In accordance with SFAS Number 116, Accounting for Contributions Received and Contributions Made, contributions received, including unconditional promises to give, are recognized as revenues in the period received at their fair values. Contributions made, including unconditional promises to give, are recognized as expenses in the period made at their fair values. Conditional promises to give, whether received or made, are recognized when they become unconditional, that is, when the conditions are substantially met.

This Statement requires non-profit organizations to distinguish between contributions received that increase permanently restricted net assets, temporary restricted net assets, and unrestricted net assets. It also requires recognition of the expiration of donor-imposed restrictions in the period in which the restriction expire.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and other supports and expenses during the year. Accordingly, actual results could vary from the estimates that were used.

Donor-Imposed Restriction

Donor-imposed restriction assets are reported as temporarily restricted net assets and/or permanently restricted net assets. *Temporarily Restricted Net Assets* are those net assets limited by donors to: (a) later periods of time or after specified dates or (b) specific purposes. When a donor-imposed restriction is satisfied, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets and reported in the statement of activities as Net Assets Released from Restrictions. *Permanently Restricted Net Assets* must be maintained in perpetuity. At June 30, 2007 and 2006 there are not *Permanently Restricted Net Assets*.

Property, Plant and Equipment

Property, plant and equipment over an individually cost of \$1,000 will be capitalized. Lesser amounts are expensed. Purchase property, plant and equipment are capitalized at cost. Donations of property, plant and equipment are recorded as contributions at their estimated fair value. Such donations are reported as unrestricted contributions unless the donor has restricted the donated asset to a specific purpose. Assets donated with explicit restrictions regarding their use and contributions of cash that must be used to acquire property, plant and equipment are reported as restricted contributions. Absent donor stipulations regarding how long those donated assets must be maintained, **INTECO** reports expirations of donor restrictions when the donated or acquired assets are placed in service as instructed by the donor. A reclassification is made from temporary restricted net assets to unrestricted net assets at that time.

The costs of leasehold improvements, if any, are depreciated (amortized) over the lesser of the length of the related leases or the estimated useful lives of the assets. Depreciation is computed on the straight-line method as follow:

Income Taxes

INTECO is a non-profit organization that is exempt from Income Tax under Section 1104(4) of the Commonwealth Internal Revenues Code of 1994, as amended.

Supplemental Cash Flows Information

For purposes of the Statement of Cash Flows, all highly liquid investments with a maturity of three months or less are considered to be cash equivalents. As of June 30, 2007 and 2006 no cash equivalents exists.

NOTE 2 CONSIDERATION OF CREDIT RISK

The bank deposit account is maintained at high credit qualify financial institutions. The balances of cash, at times, may exceed the Federal Insurance Deposit Corporation (FDIC) limits. At June 30, 2007 and 2006 the amount of cash deposits in excess of FDIC limits was \$150,000 and \$0, respectively.

NOTE 4 COMPENSATED ABSENCES

Employees are entitled to pay vacation, sick leaves, and personnel lays off, depending on length of service and others factors. The amount to be paid for sick leave and lays off is not determinable and will depend on the number of years in service, for such reason no accrual is made for this concept. At June 30, 2007 and 2006, the accrued vacations were \$5,790 and \$3,593, respectively.

NOTE 5 LINE OF CREDIT

INTECO has a \$250,000 and \$100,000 of line of credit from Popular Bank of Puerto Rico for the years 2006-2007 and 2005-2006, respectively. Any short-term borrowings from this line of credit will due at 90 days. The unpaid principal shall bear interest at a floating rate per annum equal to the sum of the prime rate plus 2%, provided, however, that in case of any event of default under this note, the unpaid principal shall thereafter until paid, bear interest at floating rate per annum equal to the sum of the prime rate plus 5%. This debt has certain debt covenants associated with it; and, in management's opinion, **INTECO** is in compliance with these covenants. The line of credit is expected to be renewed under substantially the same terms. The available balance of this line of credit at June 30, 2007 and 2006 were \$89,328 and \$100,000, respectively.

NOTE 6 OPERATING LEASES

INTECO has a long-term operating lease agreement covering a program facility in Humacao, since starts at September 2007, and have a term of ten (10) years. For the Fiscal Year ended June 30, 2007 and 2006 there were no rent expense under the above and other operating leases. Commitment's under non-cancelable operating leases (covering operating premises and equipment) for the five fiscal years subsequent to June 30, 2007, are as follows:

Federal Financial Assistance

INTECO has been awarded a planning grant from the Human Resources and Occupational Development Council, a Puerto Rico Pass-through Entity of US Department of Labor, to provide services for the operation of **INTECO**'s program. Total amount of \$600,000 are awarded from the Workforce Innovation in Regional Economic Development and are available for use up to June 30, 2010.

For the years ended June 30, 2007 and 2006 at least 56% and 76% of its revenues, respectively, were received from its members under the Contribution Agreement.

NOTE 8 RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

INTECO lease a facility for central office and *Innovation and Technology Center* in the Municipality of Caguas. This lease is a one year contract, with automatically renovation under the same conditions and restrictions as the current contract and depending on Municipal funds availability. The Agreement calls for a monthly base rent of \$1. The Mayor of the Municipality of Caguas is President of the Board of Directors of **INTECO**.

INTECO lease a facility for *Innovation and Technology Center* in the Municipality of Cayey. This lease is a one year contract, with automatically renovation under the same conditions and restrictions as the current contract and depending on Municipal funds availability. The Agreement calls for a monthly base rent of \$1. The Mayor of the Municipality of Cayey is Member of the Board of Directors of **INTECO**.

INTECO uses a facility for *Innovation and Technology Center* in the Municipality of Juncos. No contract agreement exists. The Mayor of the Municipality of Juncos is Member of the Board of Directors of **INTECO**.

NOTE 9 CONTRIBUTION AGREEMENTS

As of September 3, 2003 all members signed a Contribution Agreement in which they will contribute cash, property, technological capital and in-kind services to **INTECO**. The Contribution Agreement is for five years. The individual contribution range is from \$5,000 to \$1,000,000.

A new Contribution Agreement was signed with INTECO's members during October 2004 and June 2005. Contributions will be in technological capital and in-kind services to INTECO. The Contribution Agreement is for three years. The individual contribution is \$10,000 approximately. In 2005 the Board of Directors determined to accept commercial, industrial entities, or associations that pledge to contribute at least \$10,000 in a period of three (3) years.

In November 2005 the Board of Directors determined that the Municipalities will contribute \$1 per inhabitant each year.

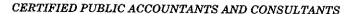

INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

We have audited the accompanying statement of financial position of **Iniciativa Tecnológica Centro Oriental**, **Inc.** (INTECO) as of June 30, 2008 and 2007, and the related statements of activities, and cash flows for the years then ended. NOTE 1 NATURE OF ACTIVITIES AND SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Nature of Activities

Iniciativa Tecnológica Centro Oriental, Inc. (**INTECO**) was organized under the General Corporation Law of 1995 of the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico on September 4, 2004 as a non-profit organization. **INTECO** is organized and operated exclusively for charitable, scientific and educational purposes within the meaning of Sections 501 (c) (3), 170 (c) (2) (B) and 2055 (a) (2) of the United Sates Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, and within the meaning of Section 1104 (4) of the Commonwealth Internal Revenues Code of 1994, as amended, 14 L.P.R.A. 8501 (4).

The purposes for which INTECO is formed are to:

- 1. Broaden the industrial base of the east-central region of Puerto Rico.
- 2. Foster the creation of jobs in the east-central region of Puerto Rico.
- 3. Generate new sources of economic benefits for the east-central region of Puerto Rico.

INTECO is supported primarily through donor contributions and grants.

Basis of Accounting

Basis of accounting refers to the point at which revenues and expenditures are recognized in the accounts and reported in the statement of activities. It relates to the timing of the measurements made, regardless of the measurement focus applied.

Unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets, and permanently restricted net assets, follow the accrual basis of accounting. Under this basis revenues are recorded when earned, independently when are collected, and expenses are recorded when incurred, independently when are paid.

Contributions Received and Contributions Made

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Donor-imposed restriction assets are reported as temporarily restricted net assets and/or permanently restricted net assets. *Temporarily Restricted Net Assets* are those net assets limited by donors to: (a) later periods of time or after specified dates or (b) specific purposes. When a donor-imposed restriction is satisfied, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets and reported in the statement of activities as Net Assets Released from Restrictions. *Permanently Restricted Net Assets* must be maintained in perpetuity. At June 30, 2008 and 2007 there are not *Permanently Restricted Net Assets*.

Property, Plant and Equipment

Property, plant and equipment over an individually cost of \$1,000 will be capitalized. Lesser amounts are expensed. Purchase property, plant and equipment are capitalized at cost. Donations of property, plant and equipment are recorded as contributions at their estimated fair value. Such donations are reported as unrestricted contributions unless the donor has restricted the donated asset to a specific purpose. Assets donated with explicit restrictions regarding their use and contributions of cash that must be used to acquire property, plant and equipment are reported as restricted contributions. Absent donor stipulations regarding how long those donated assets must be maintained, **INTECO** reports expirations of donor restrictions when the donated or acquired assets are placed in service as instructed by the donor. A reclassification is made from temporary restricted net assets to unrestricted net assets at that time.

Property, Plant and Equipment - continuation

The costs of leasehold improvements, if any, are depreciated (amortized) over the lesser of the length of the related leases or the estimated useful lives of the assets. Depreciation is computed on the straight-line method as follow:

Income Taxes

INTECO is a non-profit organization that is exempt from Income Tax under Section 1104(4) of the Commonwealth Internal Revenues Code of 1994, as amended.

Supplemental Cash Flows Information

For purposes of the Statement of Cash Flows, all highly liquid investments with a maturity of three months or less are considered to be cash equivalents. As of June 30, 2008 and 2007 no cash equivalents exists.

NOTE 2 CONSIDERATION OF CREDIT RISK

The bank deposit account is maintained at high credit qualify financial institutions. The balances of cash, at times, may exceed the Federal Insurance Deposit Corporation (FDIC) limits. At June 30, 2008 and 2007 the amount of cash deposits in excess of FDIC limits was \$150,000 and \$0, respectively.

NOTE 4 COMPENSATED ABSENCES

Employees are entitled to pay vacation, sick leaves, and personnel lays off, depending on length of service and others factors. The amount to be paid for sick leave and lays off is not determinable and will depend on the number of years in service, for such reason no accrual is made for this concept. At June 30, 2008 and 2007, the accrued vacations were \$29,800 and \$5,790, respectively.

NOTE 5 LINE OF CREDIT

INTECO has a \$250,000 of line of credit from Popular Bank of Puerto Rico for the years 2007-2008 and 2006-2007. Any short-term borrowings from this line of credit will due at 90 days. The unpaid principal shall bear interest at a floating rate per annum equal to the sum of the prime rate plus 2%, provided, however, that in case of any event of default under this note, the unpaid principal shall thereafter until paid, bear interest at floating rate per annum equal to the sum of the prime rate plus 5%. This debt has certain debt covenants associated with it; and, in management's opinion, **INTECO** is in compliance with these covenants. The line of credit is expected to be renewed under substantially the same terms. The available balance of this line of credit at June 30, 2008 and 2007 were \$59,402 and \$89,328, respectively.

INTECO has a \$1,700,000 of line of credit from Popular Bank of Puerto Rico for the year 2007-2008. Any borrowings from this line of credit will due at December 31, 2008. The unpaid principal shall bear interest at a floating rate per annum equal to the sum of the prime rate plus 1.75%, provided, however, that in case of any event of default under this note, the unpaid principal shall thereafter until paid, bear interest at floating rate per annum equal to the sum of the prime rate plus 4.75%. This debt has certain debt covenants associated with it; and, in management's opinion, **INTECO** is in compliance with these covenants. The line of credit is expected to be renewed under substantially the same terms. The available balance of this line of credit at June 30, 2008 was \$1,368,931.

Federal Financial Assistance

INTECO has been awarded a planning and implementation grant from the Human Resources and Occupational Development Council, a Puerto Rico Pass-through Entity of US Department of Labor, to provide services for the operation of **INTECO**'s program. Total amount of \$2,425,000 are awarded from the Workforce Innovation in Regional Economic Development and are available for use up to January 29, 2009.

INTECO has been awarded a planning grant from the U.S. Department of Commerce, to provide services for the operation of **INTECO**'s program. Total amount of \$120,000 are awarded from the Short-term Planning Grant Program and are available for use up to December 31, 2008.

The Agreement calls for a monthly base rent of \$1. The Mayor of the Municipality of Cayey is Member of the Board of Directors of **INTECO**.

INTECO uses a facility for *Innovation and Technology Center* in the Municipality of Juncos. No contract agreement exists. The Mayor of the Municipality of Juncos is Member of the Board of Directors of INTECO.

In 2005 the Board of Directors determined to accept commercial, industrial entities, or associations that pledge to contribute at least \$10,000 in a period of three (3) years.

In November 2005 the Board of Directors determined that the Municipalities will contribute \$1 per inhabitant each year.
