e-Vermont: The Vermont Community Broadband Project

Biographical Statements of Leadership Team Members

Heather Chirtea is the founder and Executive Director of Digital Wish, a public charity on a mission to modernize American classrooms and prepare students for tomorrow's workforce. Similar to a gift registry, educators build technology wish lists and invite parents, community members, and local businesses to grant technology wishes through online donations. The many social networking features of www.digitalwish.org have led educators to call it "...a FaceBook for teachers," registering over 14,000 teacher members. As a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization, Digital Wish received the prestigious fellowship award from the Draper Richards Foundation to fund 3 years of operations. Digital Wish now spearheads the Vermont School Modernization Initiative. Heather has united all of the educational leadership organizations to plan tactical adoption of collaborative internet learning across rural areas. This initiative has received boardlevel endorsements from the VT Principals' Association, VT Superintendents' Association, 6 regional Educational Services Agencies, VITA-Learn (the association for technology coordinators), VT-NEA (teacher's union), and the VT School Board Association. As the previous longstanding president of Tool Factory, an educational software publisher, Heather watched as funding for education technology continuously declined nationwide until today, over 75% of teachers classify themselves as "often in need of" or "desperate for" technology resources. She created Digital Wish to empower teachers to solve their own technology shortfalls at a local level. As an accomplished lecturer, for the past 8 years Heather has traveled widely throughout the United States to conduct over 400 lively seminars on technology integration. She's a firm believer in project-based learning and has designed more than 60 hands-on seminars across all subject areas. She designed and launched school internet services for classroom clip art, worksheets, lesson plans, and formative testing and assessment. With a dual B.S. in communications and operational management (statistics) from Syracuse University, Heather also serves on the board of directors for VITA-Learn and New England ISTE.

Paul Costello has served as the Executive Director of the Vermont Council on Rural Development (VCRD) since 2000. Charged by the federal farm bill to help coordinate state and federal rural policy in Vermont, VCRD runs an annual Rural Summit, and conducts "Community Visits" that help rural communities build priorities, set action plans, and build connections to resources. In the last few years VCRD has founded and produced policy councils around agriculture, forestry, the creative economy, planning, energy, and the future of Vermont, and has led statewide policy discussions around rural telecom strategies. VCRD's Vermont Rural Broadband Program has provided consultation services to over 50 Vermont communities, helping many of them assess and aggregate their demand and negotiate with potential providers to draw service. VCRD has been helping small businesses, tourists and local residents in the Northeast Kingdom access broadband by building a series of WiFi hotspots throughout the region. These hot spots serve the local and tourism needs for connectivity in key downtown and community sites in some of the most rural parts of Vermont. VCRD has also been promoting use of the Internet to help communities evaluate ways that businesses, community groups and town government could more effectively use on-line applications, both for the bottom line, and for their ability to communicate and work together at the local level. As Executive Director of VCRD, Paul founded the first statewide leadership task force dedicated to universal high speed broadband service in rural Vermont, and from 2000 to 2007 led a coordinating committee that helped state and federal agencies, congressional staff

and non-profits work together in policy and practice to expand rural services. Paul has served on the team that selects towns for state broadband grants for four years and has briefed Legislative Committees, Vermont Congressional Offices, Gubernatorial candidates and administration partners on rural telecom issues for 10 years. Paul is a University of Vermont alumnus and holds a PhD in intellectual history from McGill University. In addition to his work at VCRD, Costello is a Board Member of Housing Vermont and is president of the national Partners for Rural America.

Mary Evslin served as Chair of the Vermont Telecommunications Authority from 2007-2009. Its role is to assure that all Vermonters have access to broadband to their home and office, mobile voice and a ubiquitous wireless data network by the end of 2010. Prior to that, she co-founded ITXC Corp. With a presence in over 175 countries, ITXC was considered one of the world's largest international wholesale carriers of telephone calls and the largest Internet telephony carrier. She developed and led the company's marketing and PR globally from start-up in 1997 to \$270M by 2002. In the past few months, Mary, a proven leader in the development of software businesses, has volunteered her time and services to the State of Vermont Department of Public Service, focusing primarily on the development of applications for Sustainable broadband adoption programs and Public Computing Centers. Her volunteer service has included: Assistance and guidance in the development of the application for ARRA funds to increase broadband consumption throughout Vermont, improve economic development opportunities for small businesses, help prepare middle school students for the global job market and make the case for broadband providers to deploy state of the art services to our most rural areas; Development and vetting of community driven broadband demand stimulus projects involving state agencies, nonprofits and over 30 Vermont communities; Meeting with education consultants, Vermont Dept. of Ed leadership and drafting proposals to include in the education section of the application; Researching, writing and refining financial reports for the application; Recruiting and developing relationships with philanthropists who are willing to support the application with matching funds; and Negotiations and Program development with executives at local and national retailers that will offer affordable hardware pricing for new adopters of broadband services. Mary has been instrumental in driving the vision behind the program to grow broadband demand in Vermont. Her managerial expertise and diverse network of industry leaders, education executives, and philanthropists has enabled the partners to harness resources that otherwise would not be available.

Lenae Quillen-Blume the State Director of the Vermont Small Business Development Center (VtSBDC). VtSBDC, a partnership of business, education and government, is a statewide organization providing business advising and training programs. In addition to core services VtSBDC has statewide programs for Technology Commercialization, Regulatory Assistance, Agribusiness, Servicemember Connected/Veterans Assistance, and Youth Entrepreneurship. Key to our service delivery is our network of business advisors that work in local communities and with community partnerships. We focus on use of the Internet for all businesses as a key component of doing business in today's environment. Lenae was instrumental in founding the New England Professional Development program for the six New England Small Business Development Centers. The focus is to assure that all business advisors have current skills with a key component on the use of the Internet to conduct business. Lenae has extensive experience in federal grant management through VtSBDC awards such as FAST, SBA, RBEG, and others. Lenae holds an MBA from James Madison University. In addition to her work at VtSBDC,

Quillen-Blume is a Board Member of the Vermont Sustainable Jobs Fund and is President of the Vermont Business Education Corporation.

Martha Reid has served as Vermont State Librarian since August 2008. She oversees the Vermont Department of Libraries (DOL), whose mission is: to collect, organize, and disseminate information and library materials to the three branches of State government, libraries statewide, the general public, and Vermonters with special needs, including operation of the Library for the Blind and Physically Handicapped; to support and strengthen local public libraries; to foster new means for statewide cooperation and resource sharing among all types of libraries; and to increase public awareness of libraries and their services and to act as an advocate on their behalf. The DOL works closely with Vermont's 190 independent public libraries providing support for the development of a wide variety of programs and services, including library technology and computer services for the general public. The State Librarian administers federal Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA) grant funds and also works with the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation to administer computer hardware grants to public libraries. With foundation support, the DOL has awarded grants to public libraries across the state to build public library computing centers, and to assist libraries in a variety of automation projects. Today 97% of the state's population has public library service available in their towns or by contract with a nearby town. In 2007-08 Vermont's public libraries recorded 3,070,184 visits (5.91 visits per capita). Their 912 computers were used 14,980 times each week, a 7.7% increase over the previous year. The Department of Libraries coordinates the Vermont Online Library, a collection of online databases (purchased with LSTA funds with contributions from school, academic and public libraries) available to Vermont citizens in libraries or via remote access, a statewide electronic union catalog, and the statewide electronic interlibrary loan network. In 2007-08 Vermonters logged on to the Vermont Online Library for 2,448,971 sessions. The Vermont DOL also oversees the State Library/State Law Library and two regional library centers. Martha has a Master's Degree in Library Science from the University of Wisconsin and, before her current position, worked for over 30 years in public libraries in Virginia, Connecticut, Colorado and Vermont. She serves as President of the Vermont Public Library Foundation, a non-profit organization that awards grants to public libraries, is Secretary of the Vermont Board of Libraries, and is a Board member of the Vermont Historical Society.

Linda Rossi, Assistant State Director of Vermont Small Business Development Center (VtSBDC), is responsible for marketing, public relations, training and development of new programs for the organization. She represents VtSBDC on several state-wide committees aimed at strengthening small business success in Vermont. Linda has acted as project manager for several strategic initiatives. One involved the organization, implementation, data analysis and communication on seven Industry Sector forums as part of the Vermont State College Workforce and Business Development project. She is a certified facilitator of several entrepreneurship curriculums, including FastTrac, NxLevel and REAL. She started with VtSBDC as a business advisor, helping small businesses with planning, marketing and finance. Linda has over twenty years of experience in both large and small companies. In her nine years with the IBM Corporation in Hartford, CT, she specialized as a national project manager on public and private sector contracts. Linda was a member of the professional services team pioneering a new way of selling services & solutions in an ever-changing marketplace and understands the importance of being customer driven. She is also an experienced business manager; having held that position in four separate companies; thus giving her insight into the realities faced by small business owners.

Linda earned her B.S. at the University of Hartford (Business Administration, Marketing). She is an officer of the Vermont Business Education Corporation, and is active in her community as a Director and Coach of the Rutland Figure Skating Club, and is Chairperson of the Sudbury Road Race Committee.

Charlie Smith, Consultant and Senior Associate at the Snelling Center for Government, has served, over the last 13 years in the executive ranks of the Vermont banking, government and non-profit sectors. He worked for Key Bank and its predecessors in Vermont for 15 years, culminating with six years as president. He then served as Secretary of the Agencies of Human Services and of Administration, and subsequently as President of the Snelling Center for Government. His work in state government focused heavily on organizational change and change leadership. At the Snelling Center his work has focused on civic leadership development and effective public outreach and group process around public policy. He launched the Snelling Center's "Connected Age" conference series including Building Community in a Connected Age and Leadership in a Connected Age. He has a very broad interest in seeing both geographic communities in Vermont and communities of interest improve their effectiveness through the constructive application of broadband tools.

Karyn Vogel was the Director of Development for the Snelling Center for Government from 2008 to 2009 and is now a Senior Associate. She was very involved in the planning of the successful "Building Community in a Connected Age" and "Leadership in a Connected Age" conferences held at Champlain College in Burlington in 2008 and 2009. The purpose of these events was to convene a diverse group of Vermonters from various sectors and backgrounds to examine the broader opportunities and challenges associated with 21st century technology. From 1995 to 2008, Karyn worked as a software engineer for Oracle, Borland, Actioneer, and Preclick. She was an integral part of the applications usability team, researching usage patterns and designing more intuitive user interfaces with fewer adoption barriers. During the past ten years, Karyn has helped many non-technical people learn to use technology, including teachers, students and colleagues. From 2006 to 2008, Karyn worked closely with a professional photographer on her transition from film to a digital format including related changes to her business model. Karyn has participated in many community-based projects as a dialogue facilitator, including the 2003 Study Circles on Race in Burlington and a 2007-2008 Mercy Connections group focused on the issue of poverty in Burlington. Karyn was one of the founders of the Essex Celebrates Martin Luther King Day initiative in 2005. She trained students and teachers to be discussion facilitators at Harwood Union High School, Missisiquoi Valley Union High School and the Milton School District. She collaborated with educators on student photography projects in many area schools, including the Edmunds Middle School Senior Portraits community service project.


Karrin E. Wilks, Ed.D., is the Senior Vice President for the Vermont State Colleges and member of the executive leadership team for a five-college public system enrolling over 12,000 students annually, including certificate, two-year, baccalaureate, graduate and workforce development programs, with a \$158M FY09 budget. Dr. Wilks reports directly to the Chancellor and works in partnership with Board of Trustees, five college presidents, academic deans, chief financial officer and legal counsel to enhance the system's overall capacity to meet its mission. Dr. Wilks oversees system-wide strategic planning, policy development and implementation, and

accountability systems. She represents the VSC in the State Legislature, to state agencies, and in state-level planning initiatives, particularly related to preK-16 partnerships, workforce education and training, and higher education funding. She also represents the VSC in regional and national initiative. Dr. Wilks has experience seeking funding for and overseeing special projects, including the statewide VSC Dual Enrollment Program for high school students, for which she secured federal and state funding. She oversees academic program planning, development and review, and the design of system-wide faculty development activities in support of college and system priorities. Dr. Wilks also oversees the VSC Information Technology Services budget, staff and operations, and the VSC human resources budget, staff and operations. Wilks earned a doctorate in educational leadership and policy studies from UVM. She has taught extensively at the high school and college level, and currently serves on the faculty of the Snelling Center for Government. Dr. Wilks serves on numerous boards, including the Boys & Girls Club of Burlington, Vermont's Education Transformation Policy Commission, the Vermont Women's Fund, and the Addison County Parent Child Center.

Michael Wood-Lewis is CEO and co-founder of Burlington, Vermont-based Front Porch Forum (FPF). This new service hosts 130 online neighborhood forums covering Chittenden County, Vermont. Nearly 15,000 households subscribe, including 40% of the state's largest city. Michael has earned local and national recognition for this work, including a "community innovator of the year" distinction from the Orton Family Foundation and a Make It Your Own award from Steve Case's foundation. He was a featured speaker at the inaugural meeting of the blue ribbon Knight Commission on the Information Needs of Communities in a Democracy. For the past three years, Michael has served on Burlington Telecom's citizen advisory committee, focusing on bringing state-of-the-art fiber-to-the-home broadband and other telecom services to this small city. Prior to these experiences, Michael led a 28-employee New England environmental service provider for five years, raising \$2 million annually from USDA, EPA, state agencies and other sources. Michael and his crew served thousands of small rural towns across New England. He also was on the management team of a 40-employee dot.com start-up in 1999 that attracted \$1 million in venture funding. Before his time in Vermont Michael led programs for two Washington, DC think tanks, Public Technology, Inc. and the Institute for Local Self-Reliance, both focused on combining new technologies and local resources to address local challenges. Michael earned a Master of Science in engineering from the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, as well as an MBA. In addition to his young family, he is perhaps most proud of being named a Vermont Father of Year.

Vermont is well-prepared to make good use of broadband stimulus funding since we have worked hard to prepare ourselves for this challenge. In 2007, I proposed a major "e-State" initiative to expand broadband and mobile wireless coverage, which was approved by our legislature. We have already mapped broadband availability and have redone our maps in census blocks to meet the requirements of the ARRA NoFAs and to fit the definitions of "broadband", "unserved", and "underserved" from RUS/NTIA. The proposal from the Vermont Council on Rural Development (VCRD) to promote sustainable adoption of broadband services represents an important element of an overall strategy to transform Vermont into a place where broadband is adopted by all regardless of income or technical ability and put to good use to make a "Smart Vermont."

As part of Vermont's planning and preparation for broadband stimulus opportunities, the Vermont Office of Economic Stimulus and Recovery (VoESR) has engaged in extensive coordination of proposals for Recovery funding for broadband mapping, sustainable broadband adoption, and broadband infrastructure; the infrastructure requests will extend the availability of broadband while the adoption requests will increase penetration and use as well as improving the economics for providers. VoESR has also worked to coordinate these efforts with other governmental and Recovery programs, including e-Health Care, e-Education, and Smart Grid. Shortly after the passage of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act, the State of Vermont was working to identify the potential projects and applicants that would make up a comprehensive approach to broadband availability, adoption, and transformative use. VCRD's proposal represents the fruits of this coordination effort in the area of sustainable broadband adoption. Although this project is led by VCRD, it represents the collaborative work by a large number of Vermont-based organizations in government, non-profit and philanthropic work, and business. I am pleased to see these organizations

As Commissioner of Education, I fully support the efforts to create a robust statewide eVermont partnership and the efforts of the Vermont Council on Rural Development. Recent conversations at the Department have looked toward ways of increasing student and parent access to technology for schools, and see this effort as being clearly in line with that ideal. There is clear evidence to support that student engagement increases around learning when technology is employed as one of the tools in classrooms. Technology in and of itself is not the goal we seek here, it is a means by which we can address varied student learning needs in Vermont. As we watch the capacity of the Internet grow and witness student involvement in communicating and collaborating using these tools, it is evident that if we do not work to help them use the tools wisely in the advent of learning, we have missed the mark.

In an effort to further this work, we have committed Title IID competitive grant funds in the following ways:

- Awarding a grant to a partnership within the state to help organize and manage a professional development program addressing the changes in practice that occur when teaching and learning takes place in classrooms that are technology rich.
- Developing a substantial grant program for distance learning education that will encompass virtual learning opportunities for all schools in Vermont.
- Offering competitive grants to schools in Vermont that are applied directly to content areas and the use of technology within them. This program is for any eligible classroom under Title IID eligibility.
- Offering SPARK grants that allow innovative classroom teachers to devise meaningful
 ways to use innovative technology devices in the advent of learning. Some examples
 could be iPods for reading fluency, netbooks for community oral history projects,
 projectors and interactive whiteboards for developing interactive displays for town
 meeting gatherings.



 Supporting and upgrading a statewide videoconferencing network that can be used to bring exciting content from national and international resources (virtual museum tours, visits with scientists, and workshops from art communities worldwide).

Overall, these efforts total more than 1.5 million dollars from our Title IID allocation. As half of our overall allocation goes out in formulaic grants to schools, those monies are also monitored in an effort to find areas where the work of the *eVermont* plan can be readily applied.

In order to make the goals we have for transforming Vermont schools and bringing education into the 21st century a reality, it is essential that we have a statewide infrastructure that furthers this work. Extending existing internet networks, improving bandwidth, speed and access to accommodate more sophisticated applications is crucial to supporting the learning needs of Vermont students, particularly in underserved or un-served areas of the State. Expanding this capacity broadens the options for learners of all ages and brings communities together around new opportunities for learning.

We look forward to working with the Vermont Council on Rural Development in making these goals a reality should they be awarded this grant.

Thank you for contacting me to discuss the excellent education program you and other educators are creating for 24 townships in Vermont. This sounds like a valuable effort to help Vermont students develop workforce skills and strengthen their academic careers as well. 



- 22. **Household Subscribers.** How many total new home subscribers to broadband do you expect to generate though the use of BTOP funds over the entire life of the program? 9,600 The e-Vermont project will work throughout the 24 selected towns. We approximate a served population in those towns of 50,000 people living in approximately 16,000 households of which 60 percent will be purchasing broadband services by the end of 2012. We expect the awareness campaign and strategic stakeholder efforts statewide to stimulate further demand and that the 24 served communities will model use that will have viral effects in their neighboring towns driving the figures higher.
- 23. **Institutional Subscribers**. How many total new business and/or institutional subscribers to broadband do you expect to generate through use of BTOP funds over the live of the program funded? <u>150</u> e-Vermont will work with innumerable groups; Vermont ranks first in the number of non-profits per capita and in the top quintile nationally in volunteerism. In every community, groups form to lead efforts from conservation and supporting local farmers to youth sports and energy planning. In each town, project staff will help leaders investigate and deploy new Internet tools to expand their capacity and success.

In addition to the 150 new users targeted by e-Vermont, we will work with many businesses and civic groups that will already have broadband services, but not know how to effectively use them. Workplace and civic expansion of uses will create additional demand for people to also be 'on-line' at home too—one more way all the features of this platform work together. New Internet uses in these institutional subscribers will encourage many who have dial up or limited bandwidth to expand on their original subscriptions for higher speed services.

24. Users of Public Access Facilities. How many total users of broadband in public computer centers or users of broadband outside the home do you expect to generate through the use of BTOP funds over the entire life of the program funded? 22,800 e-Vermont services through 24 public libraries will involve an average of 500 patrons annually (12,000). Civic clubs, municipal offices, adult activities in schools and state colleges will involve another 200 residents per town (4,800). If we add children and teacher's use in the schools, we will be advancing the use of 6,000 additional users.

- 25. **Population Demographics:** e-Vermont will work with all parts of each community served and all parts of the local population. As of the 2000 Census, Vermont's population was 608,827 making it the second least populated state (following Wyoming). Vermont is considered, with Wyoming, the most rural state in the nation based on the number of Vermonters living in towns under 20,000 in population. Vermont's largest city, Burlington, has a population of 39,148; the State Capitol, Montpelier is the smallest in the country with a population of just under 8,000. Only 9 towns and cities have more than 10,000 people. With 255 towns, and no meaningful county government, Vermont is famous for the independence and activism of its communities. Vermont has the smallest economy in the nation. Chittenden County, the state's only metropolitan region, contains one third of the state's population and more than a third of its economic activity with half the jobs created in the last 10 years. Rural Vermont towns have lost youth (see aging statistics in Purpose section) and are desperate for the new opportunities that the Internet can bring.
- 26. **People Trained/Educated**. If you intend to provide training and education, how many people **in total** will your program reach? <u>1,860</u> e-Vermont partners expect to work with over 200 teachers in local schools (who directly affect 2,200 students and indirectly influence 4,000 parents) and provide brief digital literacy instructions to at least 860 family members through Digital Wish at the schools. 400 members of civic groups, municipal offices, public health and safety staff and other beneficiaries of services and over 200 businesses leaders and and their employees (an additional 200). Much will depend on local needs and the decisions of e-Vermont Community Task Forces in each of the 24 selected communities.
- 27. **Scope of Training/Education Programs**. How many hours of training do you expect to provide per person on average for each participant in your training program(s), through completion of training for that individual? If you will offer multiple programs, provide estimates for each program.

Training will range from single 2-hour tutorials in basic community literacy for elders to intensive SBDC business development education and training that may provide 40 hours of direct and/or class-based service to local businesses. In the small town Vermont environment, e-Vermont cannot format one class for all the varied interests, skill levels and diverse needs that we seek to address. Tutorials, custom small group sessions, online training, contracted courses from specialists in a variety of areas (using town discretionary grant dollars), and Vermont State Colleges courses will provide a broad range of offerings. To estimate today: 1060 will receive basic 2 hour long literacy instruction, 250 residents will receive 2-4 hour tutorials and customized group instruction, 300 will receive 4-6 hours of classes, and 250 will receive between 7 and 30 hours of more advanced class-based instruction. (Through Digital Wish, for example, 200 teachers will receive 4-8 hours of introductory training, 24 schools will receive 30 hours of

peer coaching and 1,152 families will be offered 2-hour computer orientation training). Informational multi-community symposia and two statewide conferences led by the Snelling Center for Government will display and demonstrate our best practice successes. Estimated attendance for these sessions over two years is 1,000 people (not counted in total of Trainings under Number 17 above). No less than 96 educators will participate in 3.5 hour training symposia on website development led by Microsoft lead staff.

- 29. **Equipment Purchased.** How many broadband-related equipment units do you intent to purchase overall? <u>Over 1,310.</u>
- e-Vermont will purchase 48 full PC work stations for libraries in e-Vermont Communities. The project will dynamically engage communities, build visibility and directly reach families by distributing 1,260 Dell netbook computer packages (including, covers, straps, home printers, Microsoft XP operating and Office Pro suites, cables and warranties) to 4th and 5th graders through Digital Wish in schools in the served communities. Through Digital Wish, an additional \$3,000 is budgeted for schools within the e-Vermont towns to meet diverse equipment needs ranging from digital cameras to laptops, and other software and hardware that will help drive exciting new digital curriculum.
- 30. **Cost of Devices**. What is the total up-front cost of equipment? \$1,321,377. e-Vermont will purchase netbooks through a special donation of Dell and Microsoft who together are providing a donation of \$500,182 that can be used toward the match for this project (based on communications with Ian Martinez, Director of Outreach and Communications at BTOP). Before this gift, the total cost per unit of the netbooks packages is \$943.95 for a total cost of \$1,189,377 for the 1,260 units.
- e-Vermont has budgeted \$1,500 for each of the 48 library workstations (\$72,000). Digital Wish will use a budget of \$3,000 per school for 20 schools (60,000). Discretionary project funds will provide additional equipment to respond directly to key needs in each community identified through the e-Vermont Community Task Forces and project staff. All will be documented and reported quarterly.
- 33. **Target Population, Awareness Campaign.** If you are conducting an awareness campaign, how many people do you expect your campaign will reach? 300,000 e-Vermont will make this stimulus program a household name throughout Vermont by reaching nearly half the state's residents with information on Internet uses. More intensive multiple media messaging will drive local awareness of program offerings and community events so that local understanding will be much deeper and detailed. We expect to reach over 40,000 residents with detailed messaging and follow-up information on best applications and practices that they could use in their communities and businesses.

Front Porch Forum (FPF) will build and host on-line neighborhood forums and social networking tools for each of the 24 served communities. FPF catalyzes neighborhood conversation that builds community and dramatically increases civic engagement and also serves as an entry to innumerable addition tools for commerce, education, healthcare, public safety and other community priorities. FPF services in 24 towns will require \$85,000 in staff, leadership and research, \$30,000 for software, web and IT services, \$12,000 for outreach, \$8,000 for accounting, training and miscellaneous overhead costs. Of the \$135,000 total costs for FPF services, FPF will contribute 20% through in-kind labor.

Snelling Center for Government: 200,000
