Pittsburgh CONNECTS centers directly support the work of jobs readiness training and career searching in partnership with three different local employment centers. Also, in partnership with Pittsburgh Public Schools and the 21st Century Community Learns program, also operated by Neighborhood Learning Alliance, the PCCs directly support after school tutoring and post-secondary career training. Finally, our centers have used nurse educators from the University of Pittsburgh School of Nursing to offer trainings in finding reliable health information on the Internet.

7. Please describe how your Public Computer Center(s) promotes economic recovery in your area, such as through providing job training, access to job searches, online course offerings, certifications and the like (600 words or less).

Three of the four PCCs established under Pittsburgh CONNECTS are directly associated with and support the work of existing employment centers. The Hill House Pittsburgh CONNECTS center is co-located with the First Source Center, a jobs and career placement center. This center is open seven days a week accommodating the needs of job seekers on weekends and at late hours. In addition the East Side Neighborhood Employment Center and the YMCA of Homewood Employment Centers utilize Pittsburgh CONNECTS laptops during job fairs and community outreach. As Pittsburgh CONNECTS begins its first full year of operation, new

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partnerships are underway with the Community College of Allegheny County and hospital employers. A significant number of our daytime users are job seekers.

Pittsburgh CONNECTS is also supporting the career exploration and post-secondary planning program for youth enrolled in after school programs at four Pittsburgh Public High Schools. PPS proudly promotes its "PROMISE" program that provides up to \$20,000 to graduating students enrolled in state colleges and universities. Clearly, helping students graduate from high school and progress to college and training programs impacts the regions economy in a major way.
