Please find this letter to be an enthusiastic endorsement of the rural broadband initiative proposal submitted on behalf of the North Florida Economic Development Partnership. North Florida Community College is a comprehensive community college offering Associate in Arts (transfer degree), Associate in Science, and Associate in Applied Science degrees, as well as postsecondary vocational certificates. 






Middle mile points of interconnection in the proposed funded service area, including the extent to which these interconnection points are in unserved or underserved service areas

The points-of-connection with the backbone service providers




Diagram of the Mid-Stage Fiber Optic Access network Existing Level3
