During recessions, Rhode Island's 49 public libraries always feel the pinch. They make do with less and squeeze every dollar. When a town is faced with a downturn in the economy, libraries are among the first services to be trimmed. Rhode Island's libraries have experienced layoffs, furloughs, and devastating reductions in funding. At least six Rhode Island libraries have just survived threats to close them. Many are very late in paying their vendors. The library in Central Falls, one of our poorest communities, had to layoff 60% of its staff. Another library building was condemned. Some are borrowing money to pay salaries. For libraries to survive, they need to be nimble and creative.

At the same time all libraries are cutting back, many of their patrons are out of work. Rhode Island now placing in the 1st through 4th highest unemployment rate in the nation, currently 12.5%. These people are in desperate need of support with resume writing skills, how to apply for a job on-line, retrain for another field, use a computer, search for jobs online, learn English, and much more. As people lose jobs, families are canceling their home internet service and depend more heavily on the libraries to be their internet resource, their community connection, and their place to learn. The American Library Association studies say that 62% of the people coming to a public library are there to use a computer. Without a BTOP grant, libraries cannot afford to provide the access that everyone needs. Without a BTOP grant, it will not happen.

B) Approach to Addressing the Need

Through its Beacon 2.0 Library Computer Center program, OSHEAN (pronounced ocean) will provide 600+ computers/printers and 10 mobile computer centers for 49 public libraries at over 70 locations throughout the state, i.e. every public library in Rhode Island. 394 of the computers are to replace existing library computers that don't work or are "so slow we don't even bother to turn them on." These new computers will:

- replace outdated and non-functional equipment
- expand the libraries' capacity to offer public-use of personal computers
- enable expanded employment training and workshops
- provide streaming video equipment to promote regional access to state wide education programs; and, to allow libraries to offer classes in one location and allow the content to be shared at any public library.

Mobile computer centers exist in public classrooms around the country and have been proven

effective. These 10 units will be clustered for special programs and dispersed throughout the libraries.

Our partner, Ocean State Libraries (OSL) is a substantial organization with 49 member libraries that provides the public with over 6.9 million items borrowed per year from member libraries. It has a membership of over 520,000 registered OSL library card holders. Nearly all RI residents have access to an OSL library in their own communities.

OSL has the perspective and experience to address the technology problems in its member libraries. It has been actively engaged with its member libraries to articulate their needs for this program.

C) Areas to Be Served

All Rhode Island libraries will benefit from Beacon 2.0 LCC, including 49 libraries at over 70 locations, issuing library cards to over half of the state's total population. Because the state's public libraries collectively blanket the state, the service area covers a population of approximately 1,050,788 people. The additional computer capacity will allow libraries to increase its estimated weekly patrons served by about 20,000 (26%), system-wide. And because these are public libraries, they serve all demographics and accommodate persons with disabilities. In particular, library computer resources are heavily utilized by lower-income and vulnerable populations that are most victimized by the nation's "digital divide."

D) Qualifications of the Applicant

OSHEAN is composed of 28 non profit member organizations, representing some of New England's most prestigious non profit institutions, including 18 colleges and universities, six hospitals and health maintenance organizations, and three state government agencies. OSHEAN has a track record of success in implementing technology projects.

Our partner, OSL staff spends a great deal of time researching the best possible options in terms of future trends, value and compatibility. They have the staff and structure in place to organize and implement the purchase and handle the delivery and installation of hardware and software. OSL is able to maximize the benefit to member libraries and optimize the value of what is purchased by imposing uniform standards, group buying, and negotiating for all our

libraries together.

E) Jobs Saved or Created

Beacon 2.0 LCC will create jobs for two computer trainers and one project manager. The slight easing of the libraries' financial burden due to BTOP will probably save some librarians' jobs; possible ten jobs in the aggregate. More importantly, patrons will obtain jobs due to training workshops, resume workshops, learning to post a resume on the Internet, etc. Given that Rhode Island has 70 library locations; if each location produced only one patron per month who secured a job because of the libraries' new computers and job related workshops, that would mean 840 jobs created per year. We believe that number is very reasonable.

F) Overall Cost

The total program cost is \$1,559,975. This is to purchase computers, monitors, printers, mobile computer centers, switches and routers, and training costs. Of that amount, \$1,245,500 is requested in this application and \$354,475 will come from a cash match grant from the Champlin Foundations who has made a formal commitment. Given that the public library system serves 520,000 library card holders, Beacon 2.0 LCC represents a budget of only \$3 per patron.

SIGNIFICANCE OF PROBLEM

Many citizens are without broadband access or have given it up due to the recession, this despite the fact that broadband access is more and more important to daily life. Some must visit the library to use the Internet. Libraries are important for mitigating this "Digital Divide." They provide laid-off/displaced workers with essential services (e.g., resume writing workshops, basic Internet training). OSHEAN works closely with Ocean State Libraries (OSL),

a nonprofit consortium serving the State community through its 49 library membership and we have collaborated to structure the Beacon 2.0 Library Computer Centers (LCC).

SOLUTION

Beacon 2.0 LCC will provide 600+ computers (394 of them replacements), printers, new routers and switches, and 10 mobile computer centers for OSL libraries (See list of libraries below). These computers will:

- •expand capacity to offer public-use PCs
- •enable expanded employment training and workshops
- •provide streaming video equipment to promote regional access to state wide education programs; and, to allow libraries to offer classes in one location and allow the content to be shared at any public library.

Mobile computer centers exist in public classrooms around the country and have been proven effective. They can be clustered for special programs and dispersed throughout the libraries.

Students without home access will be able to access the Internet, something that is required more and more in their homework assignments. Children will be able to learn how to use the Internet in a "safe" and supervised environment. Libraries are desperate and Beacon 2.0 LCC will help them mitigate the State's digital divide. Moreover, because the mobile computer lab approach has been proven successful on a wide scale, OSL desires to replicate them at more libraries as funding is obtained.

- 5. Beacon 2.0 LCC will stimulate demand for broadband. Teaching library patrons will create a demand for broadband access resulting in some acquiring broadband access at their homes, and others that come to the library more often.

9. Recovery Act and Other Governmental Collaboration.

OSHEAN has been working closely with Ocean State Libraries (OSL), a non profit consortium dedicated to serving the Rhode Island community by sharing materials, services, and electronic resources through its 49 library membership. Beacon 2.0 LCC was planned with OSL's existing funding opportunities in mind.

OSL has received grants from the Champlin Foundations and the Gates Foundation but is not the recipient of Recovery Act or other special funding mechanisms. In Section 27, we discuss the Champlin Foundations, which will provide matching funds for Beacon 2.0 LCC. These foundations are not related to the Recovery Act or any other Federal/state program funds so they are not discussed further here.

10. Enhanced Services for Health Care Delivery, Education, and Children

OSHEAN has submitted a linked Category 1 Broadband middle-mile application called Beacon 2.0., which will provide direct broadband connectivity for institutions that service all of the above mentioned targets, namely health care delivery, education, and children. This application for Beacon 2.0 Library Computer Centers (LCC) is for PCs, routers & switches, library mobile computer centers and services, and therefore directly impacts children and education.

On Behalf of Children

High-speed Internet connectivity has become essential to children. Modern curricula for many school subjects (e.g., social studies) entail children accessing the internet in order to perform their homework assignments. Some families can not afford Internet access, or in fact, may have given it up due to family budget tightening. Additionally, many families depend on their community library to be a safe place for kids to do homework after school.

OSHEAN has worked closely with Ocean State Libraries (OSL) to define the Beacon 2.0 LCC program. When implemented, Beacon 2.0 LCC will provide a safe haven for children to learn how to use the Internet in a safe and supervised environment. New computers and Data labs,

complemented by educational programs, will provide another opportunity for libraries to mitigate the socioeconomic-based "digital divide" that exists surrounding the every-day use of technology in our communities.

Promoting Education

Beacon 2.0 LCC will offers multiple educational opportunities, for children and adults, at Rhode Island's libraries.

- Libraries will provide workshops for children and adults that teach basic skills for using the internet
- The availability of computers to children will enable them to more effectively complete their homework and to tap into the universe of educational benefits presented by the Internet, all in a "cyber-safe" environment
- The Beacon 2.0 LCC will allow access to state wide education programs such as the deep sea project currently being offered by University of Rhode Island and the Pell Marine Science Library.
- New streaming video equipment will allow libraries to offer classes in one location and allow the content to be shared at any public library site in Rhode Island. This could include Community colleges working with libraries as "hub" campuses for distance learning.
- Computer access for high school students, underprivileged Rhode Island hish school students will enable them to maintain an electronic portfolio as a requirement for graduation; something many of them can not due, with any level of convenience.

Beacon 2.0 (our Category 1 BTOP Middle Mile program) will enable Beacon 2.0 LCC to succeed. As such, Beacon 2.0 LCC, when complemented by Beacon 2.0, provides Rhode Island's libraries with a turnkey solution that will benefit children and promote education for all age groups.

In addition to impromptu use by library patrons, people will be able to sign up for classes held at libraries, both, instructional as to the use of the computers and for specific courses streamed to the centers via the network.

NO DUES OR FEES

There will be no charge to the general public for use of the library computers or the mobile computer centers. OSL and its member libraries are committed to providing maximum benefit

for the public good, without direct expense by their patrons. This is important because libraries are an important resource to mitigate the "digital divide" that still plagues many areas of Rhode Island. Any attached fee or dues would diminish our ability to serve that mission. As such, Beacon 2.0 LCC will be offered to patrons without charge, as is the case with most services we offer in the state.

13. Restrictions on Public Computer Center Use

There will be no restrictions on the use of computers in the libraries. Mobile computer centers will be used by library staff while conducting classes and programs attended by the public. There will be some prioritization of availability for these classes.

All Beacon 2.0 LCC computers and mobile computer centers installed at public libraries will be accessible to accommodate those with disabilities. Additionally, staff will be trained to invoke macro recorders to create macros for the most useful shortcuts. 20. Public Computer Centers Training and Education Programs

Beacon 2.0 LCC will enable Ocean State Libraries (OSL) to set up permanent broadband workstations at all of its 70+ library locations plus 10 state-of-the-art mobile computer centers, geographically dispersed and located in Rhode Island communities that are the most underserved and have higher rates of poverty. These centers will allow us to offer streaming video shared among libraries.

These centers will directly benefit both the neediest public and the library staff that is working to support every Rhode Island patron within the consortium. Videoconferencing between OSL and the member libraries can be used for instruction, workshops, conferences, etc. Libraries staff, who all have limited time, will only need to set aside the time required for the actual meeting or workshop itself and not the travel time and expense to and from OSL or the hosting library. For libraries like Island Free Library on Block Island, staff would likely increase their 'attendance' from what is less than 20% of all OSL meetings and workshop to close to 100%.

For the public, these computers will be installed with a full complement of software that will be taught by temporary OSHEAN hires. OSHEAN will hire the equivalent of 2 employees for about two years. These instructors, who would be educated in the latest technology and be multi-lingual, will offer technology classes held at various OSL libraries, with streaming to other libraries. Courses will be taught in multiple languages to suite the libraries' demographics, including at least English, Spanish, and Portuguese.

OSL will record the sessions for archiving and future use. These sessions will be available via the OSL web site, the Community Reserves area of the EZone site, and from the individual

OSL is highly prepared for Beacon 2.0 LCC because they have been working with OSHEAN and architecting the program for over a year. We are ready to order, install, support and maintain all equipment. We do not require any build-out of facilities, nor do we require any special permits or certifications, because all equipment will be housed in existing facilities.

OSL and OSHEAN both have dedicated technology resources to architect solutions such as Beacon 2.0 LCC, specify the needed equipment, handle the implementation project, and manage the equipment over time. Our plan for this grant is to:

staffing, connectivity and poverty level to house the mobile computer centers. We will make plans for sustainability of the centers after the grant ends.

Quarter Two:

We will install the PCs, Peripherals and software that had been ordered last quarter and will place our orders for the second phase equipment, the ten mobile computer centers. Since OSL upgrades and expands PC bases for our member libraries on a regular basis, phase one is familiar work to us and we do not anticipate any challenges.

Ouarter Three:

We will install the mobile computer centers at eight libraries. We anticipate that these will be mobile units that can be stored in a locked cart, and the cart can be moved to a secure area for times when it is not in use. We will also set up in locked carts two more mobile computer centers that we will keep at the OSL offices for loan to libraries that want them on an as needed basis. Although we are not familiar with all of the technology these centers will employ, we are accustomed to technology in general and do not anticipate any problems. We will receive some training from staff at OSHEAN to help us be ready to train staff at the libraries. We will also order the Routers and Switches for the phase four equipment.

Quarter Four:

In this quarter, we will hire the two bilingual trainer/installers to help us implement the telepresence centers. The libraries that house these centers will be eager to get going with them. We can do some training at the libraries themselves so that the staff do not need to travel to learn. We can also hold classes at the OSL training room which is centrally located. OSL staff will install the routers and switches at the member library sites.

Quarter Five:

All purchasing and installation should be finished by now, but if there has been any delay or lag, it can be made up in this quarter. Quarters Five will be spent getting training done and setting up an archive of training sessions, so that we can re-utilize them after the grant period ends and the trainers are no longer employed. We will also set up an archive for

OSL uses the train the trainer model, OSL staff will train the two contract employees and they will train key personnel at each library, starting with the libraries that are housing the mobile computer centers, but eventually training staff at every public library in Rhode Island.

Quarter Six, and Seven:

These two quarters will be a continuation of the training and practice set up in Quarter Five.

Quarter Eight: Will continue the training mode of Quarters 5, 6 & 7, but will also include enacting our plans for sustainability. By training staff members at every library, we will be able to continue the use of this equipment long after the grant money has ended.

software, and peripherals. We will record the various programs and training workshops so that they can be simultaneously video streamed to other libraries in OSL and so that they can be reused. This will enable us to leverage our training and program activities so that all patrons at every library can have access, regardless of their ability to travel to certain libraries. We plan to install computers and printers at OSL headquarters and at every member library; and also 10 mobile computer centers, eight in lower economic areas dispersed around the state and two housed at our office for dispatching where and when needed.

Funding to Provide Routers and Switches at Member Libraries

OSL has 10+ year old equipment in its libraries. If they do not replace the equipment with newer more appropriate items they will not be able to connect to increased bandwidth that will be available to them. OSL has sought grant funds to replace the routers, but it would take as much as ten years to get enough grant funds elsewhere to replace and upgrade every location in OSL. OSL has not tried yet to replace the switches at all as it is too expensive for them.

Funding for Training and Administrative Costs

Costs are divided into two categories: the OSL staff time needed to coordinate getting the best price, order equipment, and install it at the various locations and OSHEAN hiring two part-time bilingual contract persons for 18 months to help install and train at libraries and at the mobile computer center locations. These contract employees would be at a fixed price wage with no benefits. Although short term, these would be newly created positions.

OSL staff would work on the project for the entire two years. They would travel heavily around the state in the early stages of installation of PCs, software, peripherals, routers and switches. In the later stages, road travel would still be needed, but it would shift over to the two contract workers who would be installing the Beacon 2.0 LCC mobile computer centers and then training staff at the public libraries to use the equipment. OSL staff would prepare the media notices, web page announcements, and so on for a marketing campaign to let RI residents know they have these new services and opportunities available for them to use.

reasonable. OSL is composed of a group of diverse public libraries—large and small, urban and rural, progressive and "old fashioned." Each library strives to meet the needs of its particular constituency. OSL is the "glue" that holds them together. OSL strives to maximize their member libraries' opportunities and minimize their expenses. One of the ways OSL accomplishes this is by applying for grants on their members' behalf. As part of that activity, OSL translates user needs into technical specifications and therefore controls the range of products the libraries installs with grant funds. The end benefit is uniformity for maintenance and control purposes and the assurance that all specifications, product features, and software is vetted for being the best value (i.e. best combination of product quality, functionality, and price).

To accomplish the above tasks, we have a staff that is highly experienced in recognizing technology trends; selecting desired features; evaluating appropriate software, PCs and peripherals that will last; identifying reliable partners as vendors; negotiating best terms; and installing and monitoring performance of the equipment we buy. For example, our OSL and OSHEAN technical staffs have concluded that OSL libraries simply cannot use their current routers and switches; even if an extended fiber network becomes available (OSHEAN is also applying for a Category 1 Middle Mile grant, called Beacon 2.0, to provide fiber). The libraries need this one time boost in technology and we are in a unique position to implement it at a very reasonable cost.

We know what works best for our libraries and we are used to providing it. We feel the equipment quotes we have solicited are reasonable and appropriate. Both OSL and OSHEAN staff have vetted them. We have specified the items requested in this grant because they are things we really need in order to continue providing essential broadband connectivity for our member libraries and their patrons. Because OSL members include every public library in Rhode Island, we are in an advantageous position to implement change and advancement for our libraries, with the benefit of grants such as BTOP.

48. Demonstration of Financial Need

Rhode Island has taken turns with Michigan for having the highest unemployment in the nation. The latest measure (12.5%) means that one out of every eight workers in Rhode Island is out of a job. That is a hard number in human terms and has touched all of us.

Libraries always feel the pinch more than others. They traditionally work with less, make do, and squeeze their dollars to provide the best service at the lowest price. When a town or city is faced with a downturn in the economy, libraries are among the first services to be trimmed. OSL members have experienced layoffs, furloughs, forced early retirements, and devastating reductions in municipal funding. At least six of our libraries have survived recent threats to close them. The decision to keep the Tiverton Library open passed by 23 votes. The library building in Johnston was condemned, the vote to close or replace it squeaked by in favor of rebuilding. West Warwick, North Providence, Cranston, Providence and others, are very late paying their vendors. The library in Central Falls, one of our poorest communities, had to layoff 60% of its staff. Some are borrowing money to pay salaries. We worry terribly that Rhode Island was one of the first to plunge into recession and will be among the last to emerge from it. For libraries to survive, they need to be nimble and creative.

Ocean State Libraries (OSL) is a member based organization; they have no other income besides member dues. OSL enables its libraries to collaborate and share collections, services and expenses. Libraries receive an annual grant for technology from the Champlin Foundations, but like many other charitable organizations, their funds have been reduced dramatically and they have warned us that requests for their assistance have expanded and they will not be able to give at the levels they have in the past. For its 2010 budget, OSL projected a seven-tenths of one percent increase, not even enough to stay current as prices rise. At the same time all libraries are cutting back, their patrons are out of work and in desperate need of support with resume writing skills, how to apply for a job on-line, file for unemployment benefits, use a computer, search for jobs online, learn English, and much more.

As people lose jobs, families are canceling their home internet service and depend more heavily on the libraries to be their internet resource, their community connection, their place to learn. OSL is trying to help its members to survive difficult times; they cannot afford to embark on a new capital endeavor to buy more computer equipment and access to broadband, but the citizens of Rhode Island need it more now than ever. The American Library Association studies say that 62% of the people coming to a public library are there to use a computer. Without a BTOP grant from NTIA, OSHEAN and OSL cannot afford to provide the connectivity that everyone needs. Without a BTOP grant, it will not happen.




Figure 26-1. OSHEAN Organization and Beacon 2.0 LCC Project Team
