RESOLUTION OF THE TRIBAL COUNCIL OF THE PYRAMID LAKE PAIUTE TRIBE NIXON, NEVADA

WHEREAS,

the Pyramid Lake Paiute Tribe is organized pursuant to the provisions of Section 16 of Indian Reorganization Act (25 U.S.C. § 476) and is federally recognized by the United States government through the Secretary of the Interior and the Bureau of Indian Affairs; and

WHEREAS,

the Pyramid Lake Paiute Tribal Council, the duly elected governing body of the Pyramid Lake Paiute Tribe, has the authority to adopt resolutions regulating the procedure of the Council and other Tribal agencies and Tribal officials pursuant to Article VI, Section 1 of the Constitution and By-laws of the Tribe; and

WHEREAS,

it is the duty and responsibility of the Pyramid Lake Tribal Council to support efforts to improve the functioning of its communities, as well as to advance opportunities within the reservation communities for economic and job development; and the federal government has posted the last round of Recovery Act funding for Rural Broadband Development; and

WHEREAS,

the Pyramid Lake Paiute Tribe already owns the fiber optic line in Reno; but because this line is not connected to the reservation communities, the Tribe and its members cannot derive the benefits from owning this system that would allow it to expand services and businesses, assist with educational and job opportunities and help secure future grant opportunities that will require a fiber optic broadband network; and

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Pyramid Lake Paiute Tribal Council hereby approves and authorizes the Tribal Chairman to apply to the U.S. Department of Agriculture and/or the Department of Commerce to connect the Tribe's fiber optic line in Reno to Wadsworth, Nixon and Sutcliffe and join all reservation communities and facilities to a common network;

To Whom This May Concern,

On behalf of the Economic Development Department for the Pyramid Lake Paiute Tribe, I am writing this letter in support of the Tribe's Broadband Technologies Opportunities Program (BTOP) grant application. The objective of the Economic Development Department is to improve the quality of life on the Pyramid Lake Indian Reservation by creating jobs and revenue opportunities for Tribal Members. The Department believes that the Tribe's proposed grant application will greatly support Tribe in achieve its Economic Development goals and to develop an industrial park on the reservation.

The Tribe has recently prepared a strategic plan to guide Economic Development on the reservation. Included in the strategic plan are four goals that could be accelerated by the development of new broadband infrastructure on the reservation. The first goal in the plan to be benefited by the project is Goal 2.2: "Create New Tribal Enterprise Opportunities Both On and Off the Reservation". The Department believes that the proposed broadband project could help the Tribe develop new opportunities for the Tribe's existing enterprises and develop additional ecommerce related enterprises that are currently unfeasible due to the limited amount of broadband service on the reservation. The second goal in the plan to be benefited by the project is Goal 4.2: "Create Optimum Employment Opportunities for Tribal Members". According to a 2003 Needs Assessment Study conducted by the Small Business Development Center at the University of Nevada, Reno 65% of Tribal Members commute off the reservation for work. The Department believes that the proposed project could assist Tribal Members to develop their own businesses on the reservation and encourage the development of other businesses that would provide Tribal Member employment opportunities.

The third goal in the plan to be benefitted by the project is Goal 4.3: "Increase Tribal Member Access to High Quality Education and Job Skills Training". The closest university, community college or major job training center is located in Reno (35 miles from the reservation). This distance makes it difficult for Tribal Members to attain a higher educational degree or job training certification. The Department believes that the proposed project would allow Tribal Members to enroll in online classes and training programs which are currently unavailable due to limited amount of broadband service on the reservation. The fourth goal in the plan to be benefited by the project is Goal 5.5: "Develop New and Improve Existing Infrastructure". The Tribe lacks basic telecommunications infrastructure that can attract commercial and industrial development to the reservation. The Department believes that the proposed project will enable the Tribe to attract industrial and commercial development on the reservation.

In 2007, the Tribe prepared a preliminary cost estimate for an industrial park on the reservation located in the Tribal community of Wadsworth. The industrial park is approximately 725 acres in size, within 2 miles of two interchanges off Interstate 80 and has close access to a major intercontinental rail line. In addition to the its location on the reservation the park has a strategic

geographic advantage in that it is 4 hours from the Port of Oakland and a day by trucking haul to all of the major markets located on the West Coast. The development of the industrial park consists of 3 phases; grading and infrastructure work, individual pad preparation and utility connections. Since the preliminarily cost estimate was prepared, the Tribe has been working towards developing Phase 1 of the industrial park. Phase 1 of the project consists of grading, utility connections, telecommunications infrastructure, roadway construction and water systems.

By developing broadband infrastructure, as outline in the proposed project, the Tribe can enhance the attractiveness of the industrial park to outside developers and create optimal employment opportunities for Tribal Members. Without sufficient broadband infrastructure, the Tribe cannot compete with existing and planned industrial parks planned in other jurisdictions throughout Northwestern Nevada. Upon build out of the Industrial park, the Tribe anticipates 25 major businesses to develop inside of the park. These businesses include such industrial and commercial uses as: warehousing, distribution, manufacturing, computer centers, telecommunication industries and retail commercial. All of these uses require broadband service that the Tribe currently cannot provide.

Upon completion, the Tribe anticipates the industrial park to create 2500 directly related permanent jobs and 1600 in-directly created permanent jobs in the Tribe's economy. According to a survey made by the U.S. Chamber of Commerce in 1984, 100 new manufacturing workers in a rural town such as Wadsworth would mean the following to the overall economy:

- \$1,948,353 more in personal income per year.
- 7 new retail establishments.
- 64 additional persons employed in non-manufacturing sector.
- 202 more people in the community.
- 102 more families.
- 61 more school children.
- \$1,477,453 more in retail sales per year.

Furthermore, the study found that the 64 new jobs in the non-manufacturing sector would be further distributed throughout the overall economy as follows:

- 45 employed in wholesale and retail trade, entertainment, and recreation.
- 7 employed in transportation.
- 3 employed in finance insurance and real estate.
- 3 employed in business repairs and services.
- 3 employed in construction.
- 3 employed in public administration.

The Department believes that a broadband infrastructure project as outlined in the Tribe's, Broadband Technologies Opportunities Program grant application could have a profound impact on improving the overall quality of life for all Tribal Members. Through the development of a modern infrastructure project the Tribal Government to create additional revenue to support Tribal Members to prosper economically. Furthermore, the increase in broadband service could create employment opportunities at a scale never seen before on the Pyramid Lake Indian Reservation.

TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:

Thank you for giving the Pyramid Lake Tribal Court an opportunity to submit a letter of support for the Pyramid Lake Fiber Optic grant.

If fiber optics were installed in this community it would enhance the speed to our internet system and allow access to other departments to our Full Court Computer program. This would also allow the Tribal Court to coordinate efforts with other departments on our Full Court Computer Program. This would allow our Chief Judge and other court staff the ability to work on court pleadings outside the Court.

It would allow the Tribal Police certain abilities to get information from our computer program i.e. warrant status, court calendars and court hearing dockets and updated information on Temporary Restraining Order.

The Tribal Rangers and Tribal Police have to depend on calendars to schedule court hearing dates on citations. There is room for errors to put a wrong calendar date on a citation. The fiber optic would allow the Police and Rangers the ability to get court dockets, and calendars right off the Full Court System. It would even allow the Police and Rangers to enter a citation in the computer system. In the past we have had problems of receiving the hard copy of citations before a scheduled court hearing.

Recently, I attended a Full Faith and Credit on Restraining Orders training and was informed that a national database is being formed to better incorporate the Full Faith and Credit Law in regards to restraining orders. The national database will allow local police and tribal police to enforce restraining orders throughout the county. With the fiber optics we would have better access to the national database.

Fiber optic's would allow the Social Service Department access to the legal document forms in our Full Court computer system. It would allow them access to get information in the system on minors in need of care as well as juveniles.

Overall, Fiber Optic's would greatly improve communications within all health and safety departments of the Tribe for the benefit of the Pyramid Lake Paiute people.

To Whom It May Concern,

This letter is in support of the Pyramid Lake Paiute Tribes' application for the Broadband and Technology Opportunity Program in the hopes of replacing the Tribe's outdated system to access the internet with fiber.

Currently, the Consolidated Higher Education Program depends upon this internet system. The bandwidth that services our program hardly serves its purpose in running three computers, let alone being capable to provide an internet connection to local colleges for extension learning.

Our current system is at times too slow due to heavy traffic usage. Our online college students have complained of not being able to connect to their online class. We have lost several of our students due to this problem. By upgrading to a system that supports our objectives, more students will be able to take the classes they need and be able to do so without having to travel 100 miles round trip to attend a college class. Internet speed capacity also affects our ability to participate in newly emerging technologies in education such as the video-interactive class.

While all three communities have limited access to broadband, the service is slow and expensive. We would like our reservation to have the same capacity as other American households. Internet is now indispensable to the student in any household to be able to: research topics for school, check out books from the Library System, or fill out online college or job applications, but also the parent who can shop online to access lower prices, research job opportunities or be part of the growing online business market.

An upgraded system would most certainly enhance our Higher Education Program by providing a cutting edge system would not only meet our native students' goals, but could also broaden our Higher Education Program in the implementation of a long distance higher educational learning program.

To Whom It May Concern:

The Pyramid Lake Police Department supports the installation of a fiber optic cable to link the three communities and to provide a modern telecommunications platform to enhance telephone, television, internet and private data services and to improve law enforcement services. The advantage of fiber optic cable is its capacity to carry a large amount of data, its faster transmission rate and broadband width. Because of the Tribe's somewhat remote location, the installation of a fiber optic line would allow both Law Enforcement and the Courts to expand our capacity and work together more effectively.

Digital Court Arraignments

The tribe will have the capacity to conduct digital court arraignments and thus eliminate the need for law enforcement to pick up and transport suspects back and forth from detention facilities to the court for mandated appearances. Washoe County Detention facilities have been set up for digital appearances/arraignments for some time; but the Courts have not had the capacity to support digital arraignments. The savings in time, personnel, vehicle-wear and fuel expense would be significant. Additionally, increased safety for victims and witnesses would occur as Tribal facilities are small and do not have the needed security space to separate adversarial parties. Digital arraignments save time and money and can eliminate physical proximity issues.

Digital Conferencing and Training Etc.

Fiber optic cabling also would enable digital conferencing and voice communication via voice over internet protocol between Tribal Agencies and off-reservation entities. The police department would benefit from the ability to access remote training classes to meet annual training requirements. Numerous devices with optical connectivity such as digital pole cameras also allow law enforcement to monitor specific areas, traffic, roadway and weather conditions while supplementing routine patrols. Wireless "hot spots" allow officers to download and upload data to network attached storage servers dedicated to file sharing or a content addressed storage device to store fixed information that cannot be changed, such as police records, invoices and archived files.

Broadcast CATV, HDTV

Law enforcement would be better able to host or conduct community meetings and transmit the discussion and results to the residents of the reservation. Live feeds could provide breaking news and updates on local incidents.
