This letter is to pledge the support of Midland College for the Broadband Technology Opportunities Program (BTOP) for which Region 18 Education Service Center (Region 18 ESC) is submitting a proposal.

Midland College is a comprehensive public community college dedicated to educational excellence that sustains a life-long quest for knowledge. The College serves the diverse learning communities of its region by providing a range of flexible programs from community service and enrichment to the baccalaureate degree. While Midland College's taxing district is restricted to Midland County, our service area also includes the rural, remote Pecos, Reagan, Crockett, and Terrell Counties where Midland College operates several small outreach centers.

The most active of these remote outreach centers is the Williams Regional Technology Training Center (WRTTC) in Fort Stockton where each semester approximately 350 students attend courses to earn credentials in up to thirteen different technical areas ranging from Automotive Master Technician, Alcohol and Drug Abuse Counseling, and Business Administration to Criminal Justice, Computer Networking, and Vocational Nursing. Current credentials that may be earned include:

- college credits that transfer to four-year institutions;
- workforce training certificates that document employment skills; or
- associate degrees in a variety of career and technical fields of study.

Approximately 130 of the WRTTC's students participate in Interactive Video Conferencing (IVC) courses each semester. Ideally, IVC course broadcasts transmit interactively to-and-from one of three rooms on Midland College's main campus and one of three classrooms at the WRTTC is 109 miles away in Fort Stockton. However, aging equipment has rendered one room at each location so unreliable as to be unusable. In addition, technology advances have rendered interaction between old and new equipment difficult, if not impossible.

Informal estimates at the WRTTC in Fort Stockton indicate that as many as 180 *additional* college or high school students could be served if technology updates were made to allow full utilization of the existing IVC rooms, and an additional room was IVC-equipped at WRTTC. This would also allow Midland College to expand its current course offerings by:

- expanding the Energy Technology Program for adults;
- expanding offerings for high school dual enrollment students to include the Energy Technology and Gaming certificates, for example;
- adding readily available access to the Bachelor of Applied Technology degree;
- adding a Medication Aide program to allow Certified Nurse's Aides (CNAs) to upgrade their skills:
- increasing the number of nursing students admitted to Associate Degree Nursing (ADN) and Licensed Vocational Nursing (LVN) programs in Fort Stockton; and
- providing local IVC access for interactive meetings, seminars, and licensure or certification refreshers needed by healthcare, law enforcement, and other government, corporate, and professional groups.

The Lonestar Education and Research Network (LEARN) is a project specifically designed to deliver advanced network capabilities to underserved Texas communities. LEARN makes it easy for the students, faculty, and staff of schools, universities, community colleges, libraries, and others to connect to hubs at the specific bandwidth required. Midland College needs the following to expand course offerings at the WRTTC, access the LEARN network, and assure equipment reliability:

- Upgrade IVC capability in an existing room at the WRTTC in Fort Stockton (\$80,000 estimated turnkey cost).
- Add IVC capability to an additional room (currently non-IVC) at the WRTTC in Fort Stockton (\$80,000 estimated turnkey cost).
- Upgrade IVC capability in the existing IVC room at the Midland College Main campus to be compatible with new technology (\$80,000 estimated turnkey cost).
- Increase the current 45 Mb Commodity Internet access to a 100 Mb service with an additional 100 Mb Internet II access (\$4,000 per month subscription).

- Access 1GbE "Last Mile" circuit to Midland LEARN point of presence (POP) (\$1,500 per month subscription fee).

Especially in this year of allocation cuts and budget shortfalls, these expensive purchases and subscriptions are not within Midland College's financial capability. In fact, Midland College must state specifically that we cannot and will not contribute any money or in-kind assets to this project. However, we are committed to increasing our training opportunities such that the number of students by who benefit from the BTOP funds at will increase over the life of the grant.

The purpose of the BTOP, as stated in the Federal Register, is to provide "grants for deploying broadband infrastructure in unserved and underserved areas..." Certainly, Midland College's WRTTC serves such an area as best it is able with its dated technology and limited equipment. Midland College hopes to provide a much improved, high quality broadband service if Region 18 ESC is successful in securing funds for the benefit of all participants.



This letter is written in support of the Texas Region 18 Educational Service Center's efforts to secure U.S. Department of Commerce, Broadband Technology Opportunities Program funding.

The Texas Department of Public Safety is an agency of the State of Texas created to provide public safety services to the people in the state of Texas by enforcing laws, administering regulatory programs, managing records, educating the public; and managing emergencies, both directly and through interaction with other agencies.

As an anchor institution with multiple facilities located within the boundaries of the Region 18 Educational Service Center, the Texas Department of Public Safety would benefit from this grant with increased bandwidth and anticipated lower monthly recurring costs at each of the three facilities. The additional bandwidth will allow DPS a new ability to stream live video from first responders and provide situational awareness to our Communications Facilities, and also to DPS Headquarters in Austin. Region 18 Educational Service Center and Texas Department of Public Safety share an area of responsibility to educate and protect the citizens within the region. DPS is the state agency first responder, and in rural Texas – sometimes the only responder when a citizen needs help.

What is more, the project would further the goal of interoperability for first responders by providing the network connection for radio interoperability between the Midland DPS Communications Facility, and DPS Headquarters in Austin.


