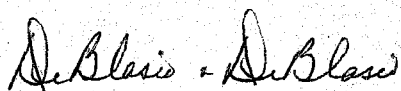
We have audited the accompanying statements of financial position of the Wireless Neighborhoods (a nonprofit organization), as of June 30, 2008, and the related statements of activities, functional expenses, and cash flows for the year then ended. These financial statements are the responsibility of the management of Wireless Neighborhoods. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in Government Auditing Standards, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Wireless Neighborhoods as of June 30, 2008, and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows, for the year then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

In accordance with Government Auditing Standards, we have also issued our report dated August 5, 2008 on our considerations of Wireless Neighborhood's internal control over financial reporting and our test of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, grants and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing and not to provide an opinion on the internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with Government Auditing Standards and should be considered in assessing the results of our audit.

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the basic financial statements of Wireless Neighborhoods taken as a whole. The accompanying schedule of expenditures of federal awards is presented for purposes of additional analysis as required by U.S. Office of Management and Budget Circular A-133, Audits of States, Local Governments, and Non-Profit Organizations, and is not a required part of the basic financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole.

NOTE ONE - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

ORGANIZATION AND PURPOSE

Wireless Neighborhoods is a not for profit organization which was incorporated under the laws of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania on December 1, 2003, and began independent operations on October 1, 2004. The organization has an annual year end of June 30th.

Wireless Neighborhoods is an alliance of community and faith based organizations committed to using partnerships, technology and training to improve communities' capacities to support childrens' education, promote economic development, and address other social barriers facing residents in the Pittsburgh area.

FINANCIAL STATEMENT PRESENTATION

Wireless Neighborhoods has adopted Statement of Financial Accounting Standards (SFAS) Number 117, "Financial Statements of Not For Profit Organizations." Under SFAS No. 117 the organization is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted, temporarily restricted, and permanently restricted.

For the year ended June 30, 2008, Wireless Neighborhoods had no permanently restricted net assets.

USE OF ESTIMATES

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from estimates.

CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS

The Organization maintains its cash balances at National City Bank, PNC Bank and Fifth Third Bank located in the Pittsburgh, PA. Balances are insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation up to \$100,000.00. The Organization had no uninsured cash at June 30, 2008.

GRANT AND ACCOUNTS RECEIVABLE

Grants and accounts receivable are recognized when expenses are incurred or services are performed under the various agreements with funders and customers. All receivables are considered collectable by Wireless Neighborhoods. Wireless Neighborhoods utilizes the direct write-off method for uncollectible amounts.

REVENUE AND SUPPORT

Wireless Neighborhoods uses the accrual basis of accounting for financial statement purposes. This method recognizes revenue when it is earned. Revenue from cost reimbursement grants is recognized when the corresponding disbursement is made; accounts receivable are recorded for the period between incurring the expense and receiving the funds.

Contributions are recorded as restricted or unrestricted based on the restrictions imposed by the donor. Non-cash contributions are recorded at the fair market value of the assets contributed.

Support, restricted by the donor, is recognized as an increase in temporarily or permanently restricted net assets based on the nature of the restriction. When the restriction is satisfied, either by time or by completion, the temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified as unrestricted. For the year ended June 30, 2008, the \$7,093 decrease in temporarily restricted net assets reflects grant funds, secured from government and foundation sources in the previous fiscal years, and expended in accordance with grant provisions during the year ended June 30, 2008.

DEFERRED REVENUES

Revenue is recorded when earned. The revenue recognition criterion applicable to grant funding is met when allowable expenditures are incurred. Thus, revenue has been recognized in an amount equal to allowable expenditures incurred. Any grant payments received in excess of expenditures incurred are classified as deferred revenue.

FIXED ASSETS

Fixed Assets are valued by the Organization at the historical cost of the assets. Fixed assets received from Bloomfield Garfield Corporation as part of the spin off are recorded at their net book value and depreciation was calculated over the estimated remaining useful life.

Depreciation is computed using the straight line method over the useful lives of the assets.

INCOME TAXES

Wireless Neighborhoods is exempt from federal income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the IRC. The Organization is also exempt from state income tax.

NOTE TWO - ADVANCES TO AFFILIATES

Wireless Neighborhoods advanced funds to participating organizations within the CTC Program. These organizations will submit qualified expenses against these funds in their program expense reports. These advances are considered current and collectable by Wireless Neighborhoods. The amount of these advances at June 30, 2008 was \$0.00. These advances carry no interest and are considered short-term in nature.

Depreciation is calculated using the straight-line method of depreciation over the estimated useful life of the related assets.

NOTE FOUR - ACCOUNTS PAYABLE

Accounts payable are considered current by management. None of the payables exceed 90 days.

NOTE FIVE - TEMPORARILY RESTRICTED NET ASSETS

Temporarily restricted net assets consist of funds received by Wireless Neighborhoods, that have not yet been expended for the specified purpose. These funds are tracked by funder and by project in the financial records of Wireless Neighborhoods. At June 30, 2008 the temporarily restricted net assets consisted of funds from the following funders:

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NOTE SIX - REVENUE

Wireless Neighborhoods receives the majority of its funds from government and foundation grants. Additional revenues are received by the organization from providing point to point wireless services to various non-profit and for profit organizations in the Pittsburgh, PA area.

NOTE SEVEN - USE OF FACILITIES

The organization utilizes various computer labs located within the City of Pittsburgh Public Schools and other non-profit entities. The use of these facilities are donated by the participating organizations. The donation of these facilities are not recognized as revenue by the organization, as they are considered partners in the mission of Wireless Neighborhoods.

Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the Wireless Neighborhood's internal control over financial reporting.

A control deficiency exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent or detect misstatements on a timely basis. A significant deficiency is a control deficiency, or combination of control deficiencies, that adversely affects the organization's ability to initiate, authorize, record, process, or report financial data reliably in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles, such that there is more than a remote likelihood that a misstatement of the organization's financial statements that is more than inconsequential will not be prevented or detected by the organization's internal control.

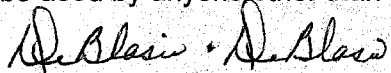
A material weakness is a significant deficiency, or combination of significant deficiencies, that result in more than a remote likelihood that a material misstatement of the financial statements will not be prevented or detected by the organization's internal control.

Internal Control Over Compliance

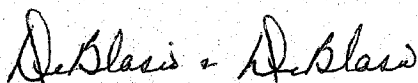

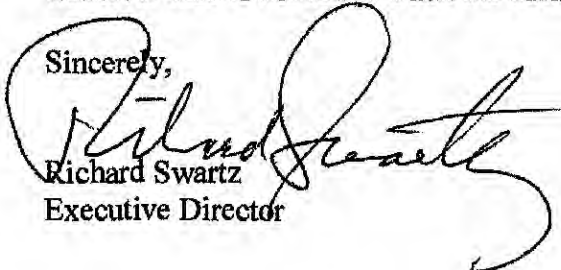
Dear Mayor Ravenstahl:

Our non-profit community development corporation is excited that the City of Pittsburgh will be submitting an application to the federal government to invest in the community's infrastructure so that we can better link low-income residents in the East End to the global high-speed Internet system.

As you know, while our public schools do afford access to high-speed networks in managing and transmitting data and information, there is negligible capacity, which the public can access, in the communities that surround them. When schools are not in session, these resources are virtually non-existent. Other than the computers situated in our public libraries, for which there is a good deal of competition, little else is readily available. People go home often to nothing more than cable or satellite TV.

NOTE ONE - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

ORGANIZATION AND PURPOSE

Wireless Neighborhoods is a not for profit organization which was incorporated under the laws of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania on December 1, 2003, and began independent operations on October 1, 2004. The organization has an annual year end of June 30th.

Wireless Neighborhoods is an alliance of community and faith based organizations committed to using partnerships, technology and training to improve communities' capacities to support childrens' education, promote economic development, and address other social barriers facing residents in the Pittsburgh area.

FINANCIAL STATEMENT PRESENTATION

Wireless Neighborhoods has adopted Statement of Financial Accounting Standards (SFAS) Number 117, "Financial Statements of Not For Profit Organizations." Under SFAS No. 117 the organization is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted, temporarily restricted, and permanently restricted.

For the year ended June 30, 2009, Wireless Neighborhoods had no permanently restricted net assets.

USE OF ESTIMATES

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from estimates.

CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS

The Organization maintains its cash balances at National City Bank, PNC Bank and Fifth Third Bank located in the Pittsburgh, PA. Balances are insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation up to \$250,000.00. The Organization had no uninsured cash at June 30, 2009.

GRANT AND ACCOUNTS RECEIVABLE

Grants and accounts receivable are recognized when expenses are incurred or services are performed under the various agreements with funders and customers. All receivables are considered collectable by Wireless Neighborhoods.

REVENUE AND SUPPORT

Wireless Neighborhoods uses the accrual basis of accounting for financial statement purposes. This method recognizes revenue when it is earned. Revenue from cost reimbursement grants is recognized when the corresponding disbursement is made, accounts receivable are recorded for the period between incurring the expense and receiving the funds.

Contributions are recorded as restricted or unrestricted based on the restrictions imposed by the donor. Non-cash contributions are recorded at the fair market value of the assets contributed.

Support, restricted by the donor, is recognized as an increase in temporarily or permanently restricted net assets based on the nature of the restriction. When the restriction is satisfied, either by time or by completion, the temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified as unrestricted. For the year ended June 30, 2009, there were no changes in temporarily restricted net assets secured from government and foundation sources in the previous fiscal years.

DEFERRED REVENUES

Revenue is recorded when earned. The revenue recognition criterion applicable to grant funding is met when allowable expenditures are incurred. Thus, revenue has been recognized in an amount equal to allowable expenditures incurred. Any grant payments received in excess of expenditures incurred are classified as deferred revenue.

FIXED ASSETS

Fixed Assets are valued by the Organization at the historical cost of the assets. Assets are capitalized if they exceed the \$500 capitalization amount. Fixed assets received from Bloomfield Garfield Corporation as part of the spin off are recorded at their net book value and depreciation was calculated over the estimated remaining useful life.

Depreciation is computed using the straight line method over the useful lives of the assets.

INCOME TAXES

Wireless Neighborhoods is exempt from federal income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the IRC. The Organization is also exempt from state income tax.

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NOTE FIVE - REVENUE

Wireless Neighborhoods receives the majority of its funds from government and foundation grants. Additional revenues are received by the organization from providing point to point wireless services to various non-profit and for profit organizations in the Pittsburgh, PA area.

NOTE SIX - USE OF FACILITIES

The organization utilizes various computer labs located within the City of Pittsburgh Public Schools and other non-profit entities. The use of these facilities are donated by the participating organizations. The donation of these facilities are not recognized as revenue by the organization, as they are considered partners in the mission of Wireless Neighborhoods.

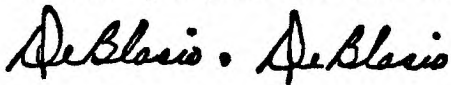

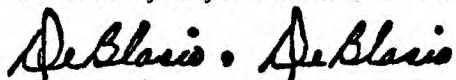

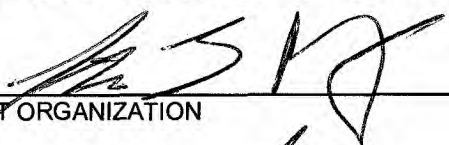
